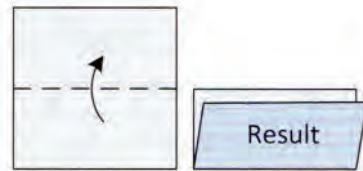

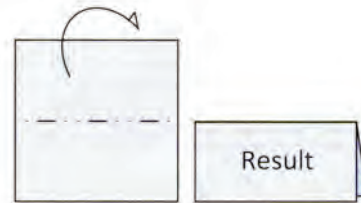

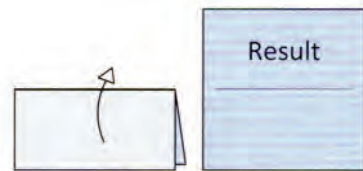
## Key to Symbols



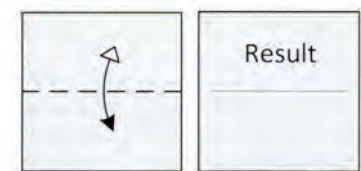
**Valley fold:** This is a plain solid arrowhead, and it means to form a valley with the crease.



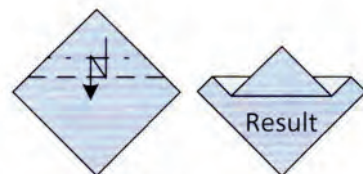
**Mountain fold:** The right triangle arrowhead means to fold behind, forming a ridge.



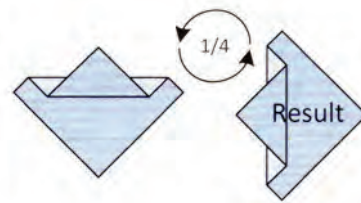
**Unfold:** This arrowhead is an equilateral triangle.



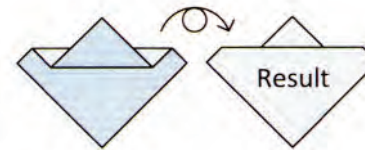
**Fold and unfold:** Fold in the direction of the plain solid arrowhead, and unfold in the direction of the triangular arrowhead.



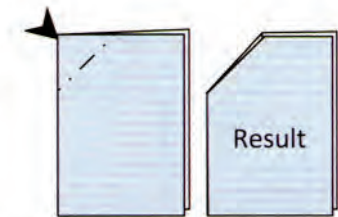
**Pleat:** This is a zigzag arrow, and it means to make a valley fold followed by a mountain fold.



**Rotate:** These are 2 arrows in a circle, and it means to turn the model in the direction indicated by the arrows.



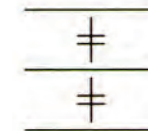
**Turn over:** This is an arrow with a loop, and it means to turn the model over.



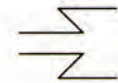
**Push corner inside (reverse fold):** This is a solid-filled arrowhead that means you should reverse the direction of a corner by popping it inside.



**Repeat steps:** Repeat the operation on the other flap or the opposite side.



**Space equally:** Creases should be equal distances apart.



**Arrange pleats:** Arrange the front and rear pleats in this way.



**Press:** Apply pressure at this point.



**X-ray view or guideline:** Shows a hidden flap or surface, or indicates where you should fold to an imaginary line.



**Enlarged view:** The next step shows an enlarged view of the diagram.



**Pinch:** Make a short crease between your thumb and forefinger.



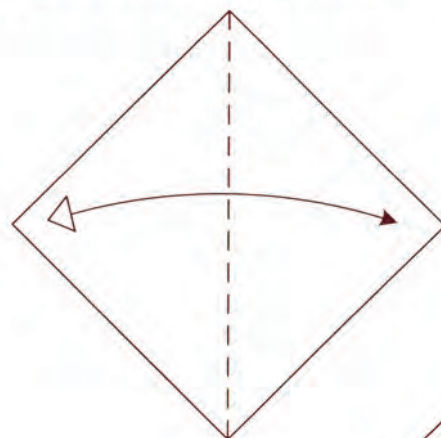
# The Wizard

Most wizards in fairy tales are wise and good, and use their magical powers to help others. Older wizards are easily recognizable by their flowing robes, pointed hats, and long white beards.

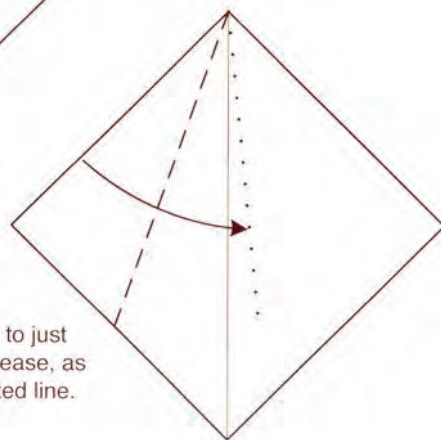


*Wizards like to live alone out in the woods where they can practice their magic in peace.*

Begin with the white side facing up.



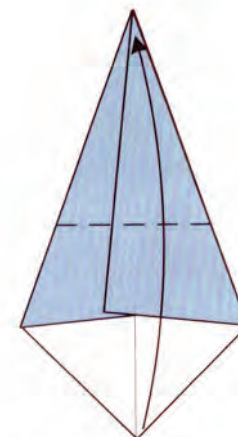
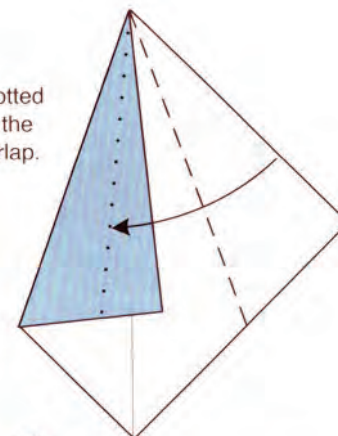
1. Fold and unfold the left corner to the right corner.



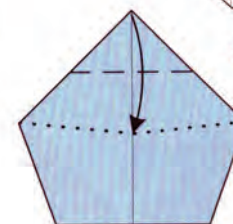
2. Fold the left edge to just past the center crease, as shown by the dotted line.



3. Fold the right edge to the dotted line—the same distance as the left edge. The flaps will overlap.

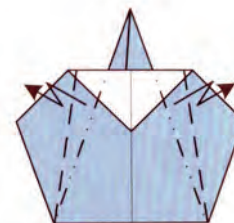


4. Fold the model in half, bottom to top.



5. Fold the top point down to where the flaps intersect on the back, indicated by the dotted line. You may have to hold the model up to a light to see that point.

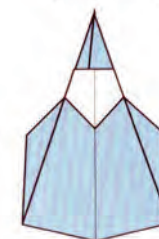
The triangular sleeves start at the corners of the beard.



6. Pleat the left and right flaps around the underlying triangular flap to form the sleeves. See the next diagram for placement.



7. Fold the left and right sleeves forward slightly. Mountain fold and unfold the model up to the bottom of the beard along the center. This helps the model stand.

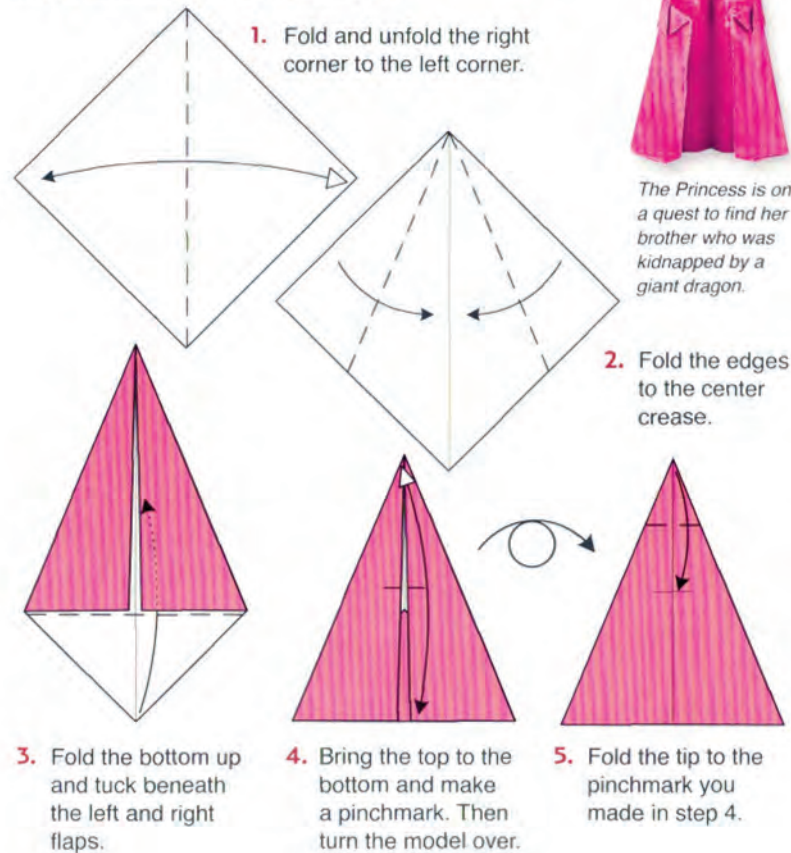


# The Princess

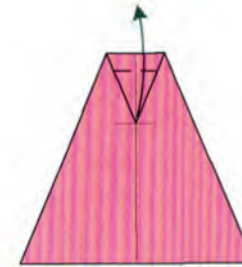
Perhaps the most popular character in all fairy tales is the princess. She may or may not be born into royalty, but this character possesses the qualities of grace, beauty, sensitivity, and kindness. She sees the inner beauty in all creatures, even those who may appear ugly on the outside.



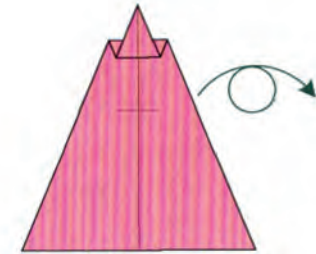
Begin with the plain side facing up.



*The Princess is on a quest to find her brother who was kidnapped by a giant dragon.*



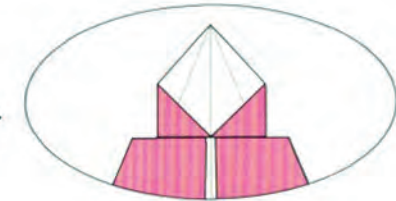
6. Fold the tip back up, making the crease about  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch from the top. This forms a pleat.



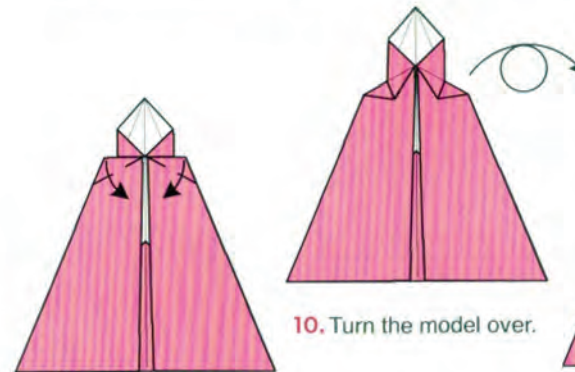
7. Turn the model over.



8. Gently slide the left and right layers of the top triangle outward. The paper beneath will be repositioned in the process. Flatten the model when the side edges are straight.



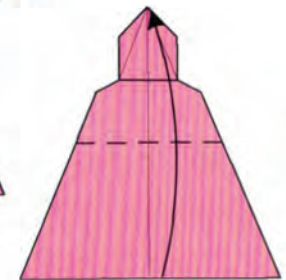
Here is the result.



9. Fold the corners down as far as possible.



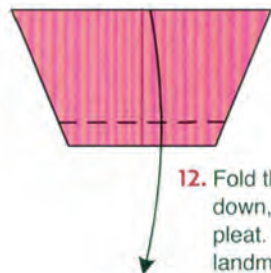
10. Turn the model over.



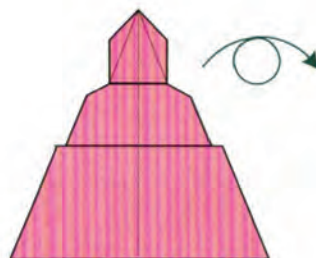
11. Fold the bottom edge of the model to the top.



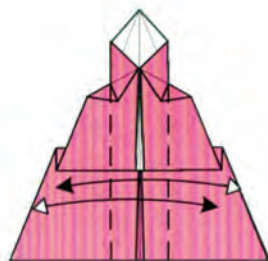




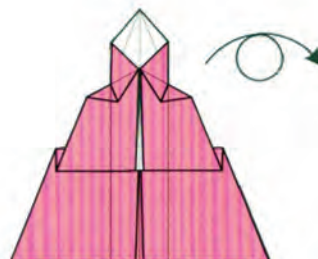
12. Fold the top back down, leaving a little pleat. There is no landmark for this.



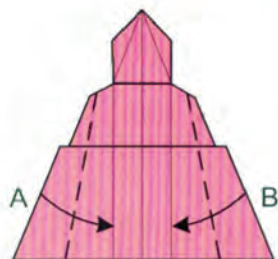
13. Turn the model over.



14. Fold the left side to the right, keeping the bottom edges aligned, so that the crease is parallel to the center. Repeat on the right side.



15. Turn the model over.



16. Fold edges A and B to lie along the creases you made in step 14.



17. Fold up the bottom flaps along the bottom edge to form the feet. Pleat the model as shown, on existing creases.



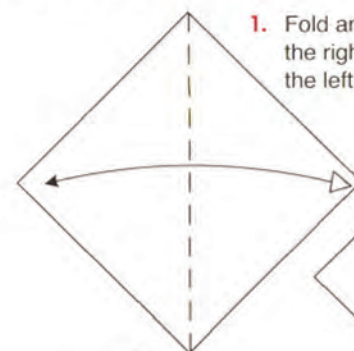
The completed Princess.

## The Knight

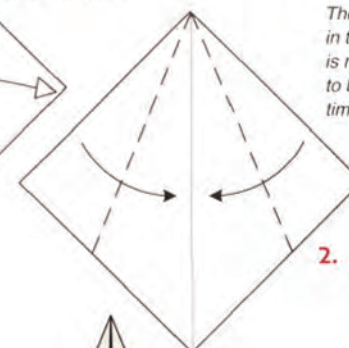
Knights are often the heroes in fairy tales. They rescue princesses and children from danger, often battling dragons and witches, and are sometimes aided by a magic sword or shield. They expect no payment for their services; just knowing that they acted nobly is enough for them.



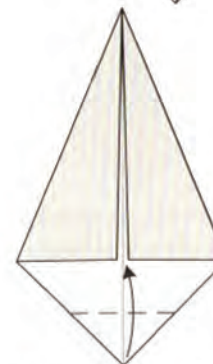
Begin with the plain side facing up.



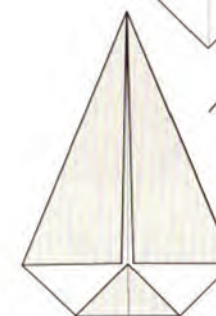
1. Fold and unfold the right corner to the left corner.



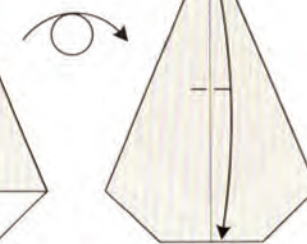
2. Fold the edges to the center.



3. Fold the bottom corner up to the edge of the flaps.

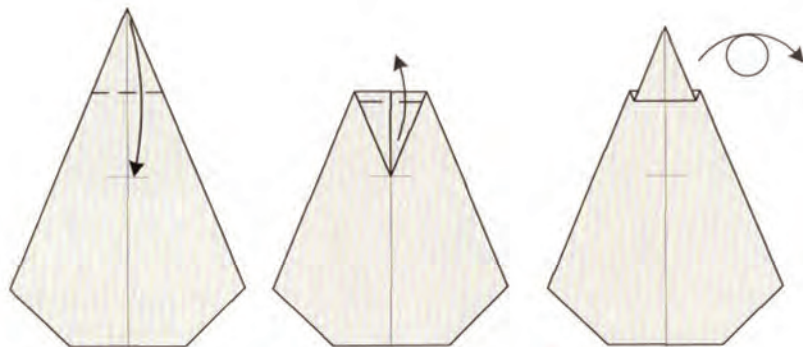


4. Turn the model over.



5. Bring the top to the bottom and make a pinchmark.

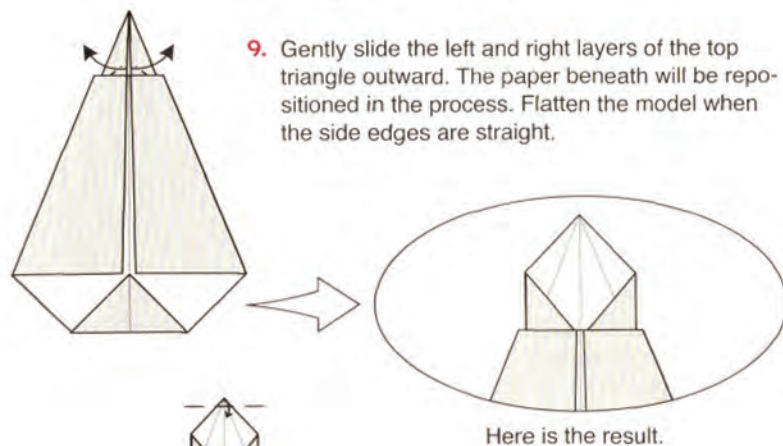
*The Knight grew up in the palace, and is now venturing out to battle for the first time in his life.*



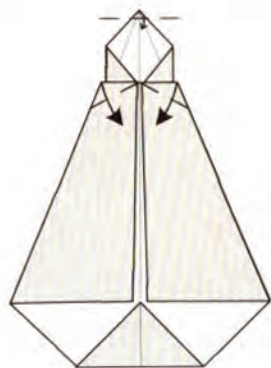
**6.** Fold the tip to the pinchmark you made in step 5.

**7.** Fold the tip back up, making the crease about  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch from the top. This forms a pleat.

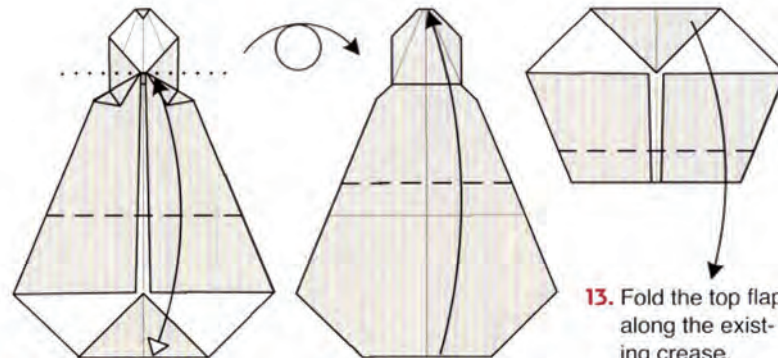
**8.** Turn the model over.



**9.** Gently slide the left and right layers of the top triangle outward. The paper beneath will be repositioned in the process. Flatten the model when the side edges are straight.



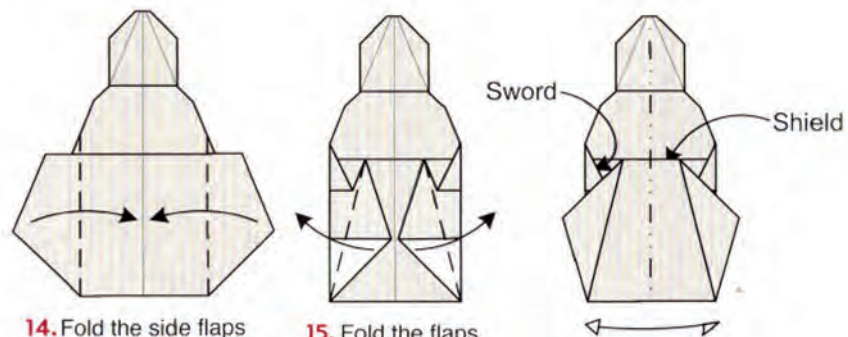
**10.** Fold the corners down as far as possible. Fold the tip down.



**11.** Fold and unfold the bottom edge to the dotted line. Then turn the model over.

**12.** Fold the bottom edge of the model to the top.

**13.** Fold the top flap along the existing crease.



**14.** Fold the side flaps in, beginning at the bottom corners.

**15.** Fold the flaps outward.

**16.** Mountain fold the model along the center. This helps the model stand. You can tuck the Magic Sword and Shield into the indicated pockets.

Can he slay the Dragon? Only with the help of his Magic Sword and Shield.



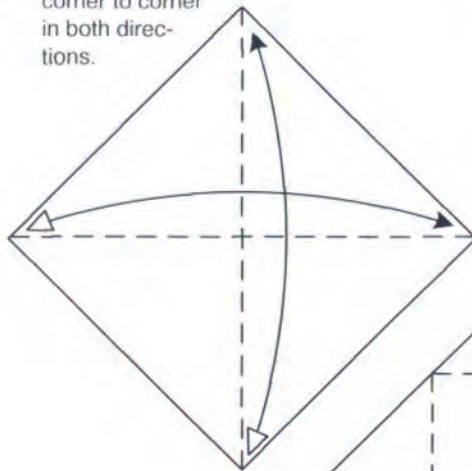
## The Shield

Often in fairy tales a shield displays a symbol of the knight's family, and it has magical powers. But to acquire the shield, the knight may have to pass a test of wits or strength. The Shield is made from a 3-inch square of foil paper. This kit contains several foil sheets already trimmed to the right size.

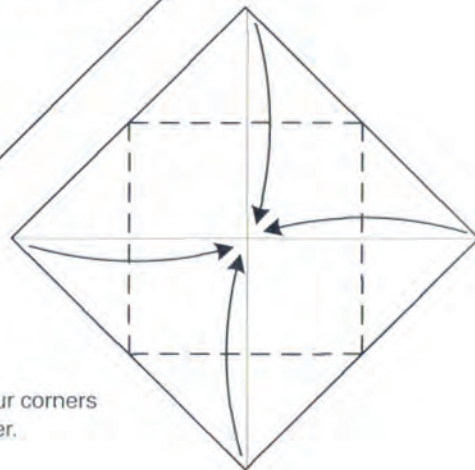


Begin with the white side facing up.

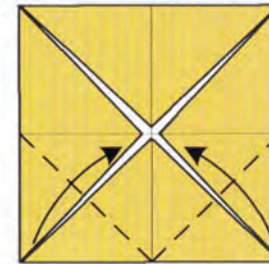
1. Fold and unfold corner to corner in both directions.



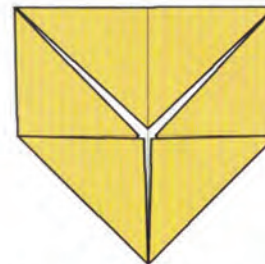
2. Fold the four corners to the center.



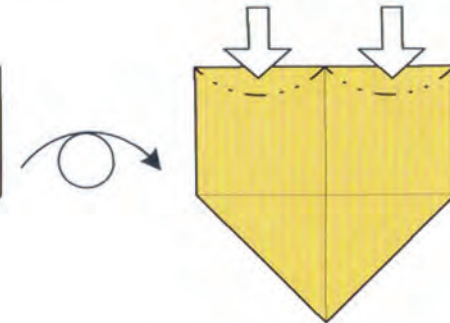
*This enchanted Shield has protected the royal family for many generations, but, alas, someone has stolen it!*



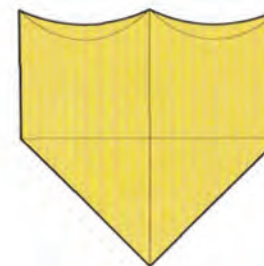
3. Fold the two lower corners to the center.



4. Turn the model over.



5. Make curved indentations at the top on the left and right.  
**Tip:** First outline the creases from behind with your fingernail.



The completed Shield. Tuck the top flap on the back of the Shield into the Knight's waist (see page 28), and he'll be able to defend himself.

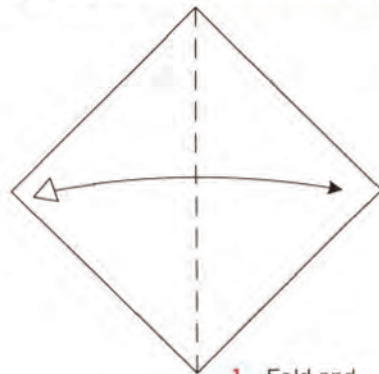
## The Magic Sword

A magic sword appears in countless fairy tales, often providing the bearer with special powers or increased strength. Sometimes it is handed down through generations and given a special name. The Magic Sword is made from a 3-inch square of foil paper. This kit contains several sheets already trimmed to the right size.

Begin with the white side facing up.



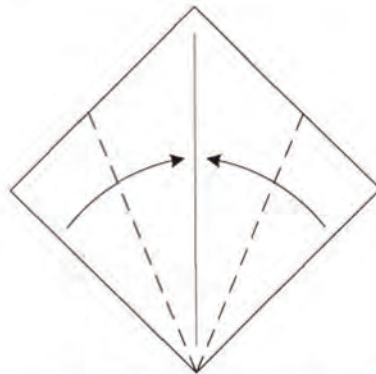
*The Magic Sword has been hidden for a thousand years among the clouds, and only one who is clever, brave, and pure in heart can find it.*



1. Fold and unfold the left corner to the right corner.



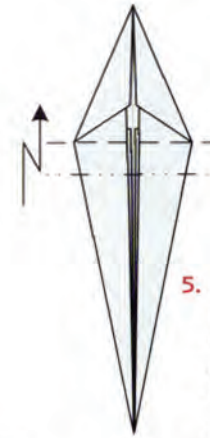
2. Fold the two edges to the center crease. Leave a small gap in the middle, since you'll be folding the entire model in half later on.



3. Again, fold the two sides to the center, leaving a small gap.



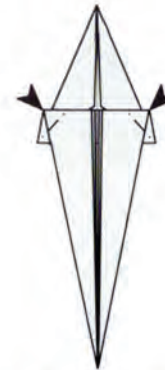
4. Fold the two top edges to the center, leaving a small gap.



5. Pleat the model. The valley fold connects the two outer points; the mountain fold is about  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch below. There is no landmark.



6. Fold the corners down, then unfold them. There are no landmarks.



9. Fold the upper corners down a little.



8. Fold the top point down as far as it can go into the valley formed by the pleat. Fold the left and right edges to the center.



7. Reverse fold the corners along the creases you made in step 6.



10. Turn the model over.



The completed Magic Sword. Tuck the Sword into the Knight's pocket to complete his wardrobe.





Print the character faces, cut out to size and match to the origami character. Stick on with glue.
